Loveland, Ohio - Loveland High School has hired Mr. Dave Spencer as its new principal. Mr. Spencer comes to Loveland with more than 25 years of experience as an educational administrator, most recently serving at Turpin High School in various capacities for the previous nineteen years.

Spencer fills the position vacated by Mr. Adam Reed, who left Loveland this past spring to take an opportunity in the Mt. Healthy City School District Board Office. While at Turpin, Spencer was an assistant principal for eleven years, working alongside former Loveland High School principal Ms. Peggy Johnson, before moving into the principal role for the previous eight years after Johnson came to Loveland.

Spencer, a 1991 graduate of Tri-State University (now Trine University) in Fort Wayne, Indiana, described his career path as "unusual," saying, "When I finished college, I stayed to work as a coach and teacher, but I was at that stage of life when I was looking to do something different. My wife and I moved to a new state with new jobs and few expectations."

assistant principal and athletic director roles at small, rural Whiteoak High School in Highland County, located an hour east of Cincinnati. Despite the new challenges of the position, Spencer said that he experienced countless valuable lessons in his five years at Whiteoak.

Along with those valuable lessons, Spencer discovered his passion for administration at Whiteoak. In an interview with The Loveland Roar, Spencer said that his "favorite part of the job is that there is no blueprint. Every day is different. You work with scheduling, discipline, athletics, special education, you name it. You witness young adults mature and grow while realizing their passions. It is a fulfilling

Spencer then settled down at Turpin in 2004. He was very complimentary of his employer of nearly two decades, saying, "I loved Turpin so much that I thought I would retire there. But I began to feel a sense of complacency, which I felt could potentially hinder our collective progress."

With its position opening, Loveland became an attractive destination for the well-respected and experienced Spencer.

Urban Legends of Ohio: The Crosswick Monster

Crosswick, Ohio is a sleepy little community located just outside of Waynesville. Despite its relatively unassuming appearance, the town has a terrifying secret; just sixty years after it was originally settled, two boys were almost fatally attacked by some sort of snake-monster. The only record of the incident seems to be a May 1882 Western Star article, archived by the Warren County Historical Society.

In May of 1882, two boys, Ed and Joe, were fishing in a small creek. After some time, they began to hear some rustling in the nearby brush. When they turned around, the boys saw a huge monster, almost like a snake. The monster charged them, and they screamed and attempted to flee. The snake came closer to Ed, and "suddenly [threw] out two large arms" and grabbed him. Simultaneously, it produced two more back legs from "some mysterious hiding place" on its body, and dragged Ed to a large, hollow sycamore tree around a hundred yards down the creek. The monster

attempted to crawl inside with Ed still caught in its claws.

Hearing the boys' screams, three men working in the quarry above the creek ran to investigate, and witnessed Ed being dragged off. They chased after them, and caught up as the monster attempted to enter the tree. Frightened by their shouts, the snake released the boy and scrambled into the opening. Ed, who was carried home, was projected to recover in a few days, but suffered from "convulsions" and fits of "fright and terror."

Later that day, 60 men with an assortment of pitchforks, axes, sticks, and similar weapons gathered around the sycamore, ready to fell both it and the monster within. As they began to chop, the beast suddenly "leaped from the aperture" and ran. However, it did not just run; it ran upright, as though it were a person. Said to be 30 to 40 feet long, 12 to 14 feet in height, and as fast as a racehorse, the monster raced up the creek, crashing through a rail fence along the way, before slipping into a burrow in a large hill.

The theories surrounding the monster are small but interesting, with some even linking it to Michigan's Milton

Lizard. The general consensus seems to be that it's more lizard than snake.

The main evidence lies in the drawing paired with the Western Star article. It's reminiscent of a monitor lizard. However monitors are not in Ohio, much less during the Victorian era. The bipedal nature brings to mind something like basilisk lizards, though those are nowhere near the described 40 feet long. Its described yellow spots and black tongue are akin to gila monsters, though those face the same geography issue as monitor lizards. Different features of different lizards seem to be smashed into one scaly, cryptid-shaped ball, making it hard to find a possible explanation.

The Crosswick Monster has not been sighted since its first eventful appearance, and has seemingly been lost to the murk of both the creek and our minds. Considering that monitor lizards live to only twenty years in captivity, it's likely we won't be seeing it anytime soon; though, if its nature is as esoteric as it seems, that very well may not be the case.

Whatever your reasons may be, His Eye Is On the Sparrow can be the perfect opportunity to "get involved!" This business is run locally at a house refurbished to board kittens, cats, and occasionally dogs. This organization is run completely by volunteers, donations, and a fun time!

You may be asking, what are the requirements? There are none! To get started it's simple - after contacting the owners by phone or email to see available times or information needed to volunteer; +1 (513) 227-8414, heiots.animalrescue@gmail.com; you can finally meet the cats! You can volunteer as an adult or as a kid.

Volunteering itself is pretty simple. All you have to do is switch out the cats' water/food dishes, give them attention, and try to attend to specific needs on notes written on the cages. There are kittens, social cats, shy cats, sassy, and silly cats! The experience itself is magical as you get to

meet so many different animals and better understand their individual needs, alongside the ways in which cats work and communicate.

On Monday, August 28, 2023, I volunteered at this shelter myself. By far, my favorite part about the experience was meeting all the cats! There were around 30-40 cats, some being kittens of course, all housed in sizable cages. As volunteers we had the opportunity to take the cats out of

the cages individually, pet and brush them, and even hold them (at the cats' wills).

I found the shelter to be incredibly ethical by enforcing significance in taking care of all the cats. This community is non-profit meaning that it does not make money and rather is seen more as a charity for animals. The animals in the shelter are typically rescues- for instance I met one that was from Home Depot. He didn't have a name, was terrified of being touched, and seemed to be somewhat feral, but he seemed to feel incredibly safe in this environment. He didn't mind the workers or the other cats- something uncommon for traumatized animals.

At His Eye Is On the Sparrow, they follow the slogan: "not one animal is forgotten in God's sight." This means that all of the animals are equal and are given the same amount of love, but unfortunately there are only so many volunteers, yet endless cats/animals who need assistance. That's why this community is looking for your help.

In this humble home for these cats, they are given love, attention, and care. Some of the cats were even given special diets, treatment, or enclosures to suit their lifestyles, alongside being given mandatory vet checks including vaccinations, parasite control, micro-chipping, and more.

With so many animals and so little time, money, and human hands, the shelter needs more assistance. So, what can you do besides volunteering? One option would be to donate- this shelter is looking for supplies such as bowls, litter, food, dishwashing soap, and cleaning supplies. College Essay Tips and Tricks

September is here, and with that comes the annual tradition of high school seniors hammering away at college applications. From picking the right schools, thinking ahead about costs, and sorting out transcripts, there's a lot on students' minds when it comes to applying for college. However, the part of the application process most either struggle with or tend to stress about the most is the "college essay" and the challenges that come with it. But before digging into tips, it's best to establish what exactly a college essay is asking for.

While most students are deathly familiar with the concept of a five paragraph essay and other informative writing techniques, a college essay generally asks for a very different approach: Creative writing. Specifically, presenting an experience of your own, in a creative, unique manner. This mainly exists as a way to give a college admissions counselor a taste of you, divorced from just numbers and statistics on a transcript. This is the reason an essay can make or break a college application, solely because it sets an applicant apart from the others more than any other datapoint will.

The Loveland Roar had the opportunity to gather the thoughts of multiple English teachers who have plenty of experience with this particular subject and gave their insight on multiple aspects of the essay-writing process. Starting with the first major aspect of writing an essay, choosing the prompt you will write about in the first place and what experience you have that will fit. One teacher told The Roar, "Make a list of your best character traits. Then, consider what the non-essay portion of your application already tells the college admission officer." Giving the example that "if you have had high grades consistently through high school, focusing on the fact that you are a hard worker in the essay isn't going to tell the colleges anything more about you than the grades already did."

However, once you have a personal experience picked out based on a prompt, how will you actually answer it? According to Loveland's own experts, understanding a prompt is a multi-step process, but the first step is to give one readthrough of it looking for a general meaning, but the next step gets more detailed. Another teacher commented that, "I make sure to bracket off all the questions it asks of you. Use a checklist to help yourself." Generally prompts can be broken down into three distinct portions, which is a useful tip to keep in mind.

Finally, the most difficult part of writing a college essay is, well, the writing itself. The best way to get this done actually refers back to the previous point of bracketing off the prompt. As one teacher advised, "Think about what each paragraph will be about before you write the essay." They also suggested writing everything as it comes to you when you can, because a long essay can always be trimmed, but a short one is hard to fluff up. This ties into what another teacher mentions, that "the best essays will not be written in a single draft, so you want to give yourself time to write and revise."

Knowing these tips, good luck in the college application season!



What is Academic Quiz Team? Is it a varsity sport? What do they "quiz" on?

Like Quiz Bowl, Academic Quiz Team is a winter sport with both a Varsity and a Junior Varsity team at Loveland High School. While it's an unconventional sport, those who spectate and those who participate can tell you that it's fascinating and a lot of fun.

Loveland's Academic Quiz Team plays matches on Wednesdays at four o'clock against other ECC schools both home and away during the winter sports season.

These matches consist of four rounds: two rounds of categories, the "Alphabet Round," and the "Lightning Round." After each round, coaches can substitute players, giving people the ability to specialize in certain areas. In the category rounds, both teams are given the chance to answer a question, but if the team gets the question wrong twice or runs out of time, the other team is given the opportunity to answer. Teams that get the answer correct on their first attempt receive two points, but getting it

correct on the second attempt or on a steal can still score one point. After the two team questions, teams are given the chance to buzz in with a toss-up question, where only the first team to buzz in gets to answer, with this question being worth 2 points. The categories in the first round are American Literature, Math, World History, Life Science, and Fine Arts, and the categories in the second round are World Literature, Government/Economics, Physical Science, Geography, and U.S. History. Following the category rounds is the Alphabet Round, in which teams are given four minutes to answer the twenty questions written on a sheet of paper. These questions can range from pop culture to mythology to obscure film, with their only commonality being a shared first letter, and each correct answer being worth two points. The final round, the Lightning Round, is the most intense, but also the most exciting to watch and partake in. There are twenty questions, all worth two points. Each question starts off broad and obscure, but becomes easier and more specific as the question progresses. To answer a question, like the earlier toss-up questions, teams must be the first to buzz in,

which incentivizes making educated guesses with limited information. Since this is the final round, the players and the audience are often at the edge of their seats, with matches oftentimes coming down to the last question.

Nate Dawes (12), a member of the Academic Quiz Team, told The Loveland Roar that his favorite part is "that moment when the answer to the question clicks in your mind, you buzz in first, and you answer the question correctly." He said that he "lives for moments like that" and that Academic Ouiz Team gives him the opportunity to "apply random knowledge that isn't often used elsewhere."

Ben Hicks (12), a player for both Loveland's football and basketball teams, said that Academic Quiz Team is his "favorite sport to watch" because "despite the quiet nature of the sport, it's the most collaborative and invigorating for a spectator" and that he enjoys "mentally competing against the athletes."

The Eastern Cincinnati Conference has been one of the more prominent conferences in Division II Ohio High School Football in the last decade. The talent pool in this conference is higher than it's ever been, but there are some notable players who stand out.

5. Paul Kelly, Senior RB/DB, Kings

The King's offense was one of the best in the ECC last year. Will Kocher led the Kings to the Division II Final Four in Columbus behind his 5,000 yards and 50 touchdowns through the air. But with his departure, along with Michael Mussari and Jake Cameron on the outside, the Kings will have to rely more on the run this year. Kelly is an athletic two-way player who I believe can make a huge impact offensively, as well as in the secondary. In his first game this year, he accounted for 197 yards and 4 touchdowns on the ground. If he keeps up this pace, he is going to be a problem.

4. Zae Jennings, Senior RB, Winton Woods

running back school in the ECC over the last half-decade with Trey Cornist and Tyreke Spikes leading the conference in rushing the last two years. Zae Jennings certainly has the talent to carry on the tradition. He originally won the starting quarterback job at Colerain in 2021 where he rushed for nearly 2,000 yards and 15 touchdowns in two seasons. With much more talent around him and an upgraded offensive line, I believe Jennings can have an Offensive Player of the Year campaign.

3. Quinten Wagers, Senior DL, Lebanon

Lebanon doesn't have the highest expectations for this season, but Wagers has established himself as an absolute machine in the trenches. He amassed 13.5 sacks and 21 tackles for loss last season to comfortably lead the ECC. He had 4 games with multiple sacks and a 3 sack performance against one of the best offensive lines in Cincinnati (Lakota West). Wagers is a monster inside and will continue to dominate this season.

2. Brodey Berg, Senior RB/WR, Anderson Quite possibly the most versatile player in the ECC, Berg has a

He put up some ridiculous all-purpose numbers, rushing for 800 yards while putting up nearly 1,000 receiving yards. He doesn't have trouble getting into the end zone either, amassing 39 total touchdowns. After putting up 80 all-purpose yards and 2 touchdowns in the Raptors' first contest, it's safe to say Berg could have another monster

1. Delan Massey-Wright, Junior DL, Winton Woods.

This guy is the definition of a game-wrecker. Massey-Wright is one of the most skilled defensive players in Cincinnati and the scary thing is he's only a junior. Last year, he recorded 64 tackles, 20 tackles for loss, and 10 sacks, one of the better defensive seasons this conference has seen in the last five years. He is certainly a candidate for Defensive Player of the Year this season and next season as well. The Eastern Cincinnati Conference is loaded with Divison 1-worthy talent, and there are plenty of teams that can make a run to Columbus.

Loveland, OH - Entering the month of September, the Loveland Tigers were trending in the wrong direction. As of September 1st, the Tigers sat at 0-3 and dead last in the Eastern Cincinnati Conference. Fast forward to mid-October, the Tigers sit at 5-4 and fourth in the ECC and are one of the hottest teams in all of Cincinnati. As the postseason approaches, this Tiger team is looking to make a big-time run at a district and possibly a state title.

The five-game winning streak is the Tigers' longest winning streak in eight years and was kickstarted with a 31-20 win over rival Kings on September 8th. "The Kings win was huge for our program and the school," stated head coach Andy Cruse. "For our players, it allowed us to have such a strong belief that we could beat anyone moving forward." Captain Max Carver (11) shared this belief, saying, "Knowing that we have a target on our back as one of the hotter teams in the area really motivates us to be the best team we can be."

Despite the immense challenges the Tigers faced early in the season, this team is confident in their ability to make a run in the OHSAA playoffs. "During those first three games, our team definitely showed glimpses of being a good team, we just needed to be more consistent and put it together for four complete quarters," Cruse articulated. Colton Endicott (12) agreed, stating, "We certainly had the talent, and our last five games have shown that. We just have to show we want it more than the other team."

During the Tigers' five game winning streak, Endicott has averaged 161.4 yards on the ground to go along with twelve rushing touchdowns, helping contribute to the Tigers averaging 37.2 points per game over this dominant stretch. Cruse felt a difference in the team's mantra during this winning streak, discussing, "From that first game against Kings, we have developed a strong belief that we can beat anyone. Our players are playing so hard, with a deep belief and finding ways to win. They are a confident group and have a ton of fun playing the game." Carver again agreed, saying, "Consistency allowed us to turn this

losing streak into a winning streak. People consistently come to practice wanting to get better and compete. We want to keep winning."

As this article is being written, the Tigers are projected to play the La Salle Lancers of the Greater Catholic League in the first round of the OHSAA state playoffs, where the Tigers would hold home-field advantage. Despite the challenges that lie ahead in the postseason, the Tigers are confident they can make a run. "Obviously the goal is always to win, but this year we believe we can win districts," Carver states. "We have continued to grow every week and the mindset of winning has flooded our program and changed us for the better."

"We have talked since last December about playing and winning postseason games," Cruse continued. "All season we have talked about Week 11 and beyond and what we have to do to win those games."

As ECC conference play comes to a close, eight of ten conference teams are still in contention for the OHSAA playoffs. The current ECC standings are as follows: Milford 9-0 (8-0), Anderson 8-1 (7-1), Winton Woods 7-2 (6-2), Loveland 5-4 (5-3), Lebanon 6-3 (5-3), Kings 5-4 (4-4), West Clermont 3-6 (3-5), Turpin 3-6 (2-6), Little Miami 0-9 (0-8), Walnut Hills 0-9 (0-8). Little Miami and Walnut Hills are no longer in contention for the playoffs and Turpin is on the bubble, and a win would likely be just enough to make the bracket.

The ECC has three Division I teams in contention: Milford, Lebanon, and West Clermont. Milford is the current one seed in the ECC as well as the one seed in Region 4. Lebanon would be as high as the four seed with a win, and as low as the nine seed with a loss. West Clermont controls its own destiny. With a win they lock in a playoff spot. With a loss they would need a Lakota East loss to clinch the sixteen seed.

Milford should be able to cruise past West Clermont in round one, especially considering Milford just recently dominated West Clermont 27-0. As for Lebanon, I expect their playoff hopes to be short lasting. I think Sycamore is able to go on the road and upset the Warriors. Milford would end up playing Sycamore in the next round where I expect another dominant win at home advancing them to the Regional Semi-Finals against St Xavier. 


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
