

Loveland, Ohio - In partnership with the American Cancer Society, Loveland High School will hold its first annual Relay For Life this May. Relay for Life is a campaign led by the American Cancer Society, with over 5,000 annual events held globally across twenty countries. The initiative, hosted on countless university and high school campuses, raises money and awareness for the largest volunteer health organization in the US.

The event at Loveland High School will be sponsored and organized by the LHS Student-Athlete Leadership Team (SALT). Nearly 60 students from LHS's largest leadership group will organize the event through twelve specific Relay Committees. Seniors Skylar Lundeen (12), Courtney Haneline (12), Olivia Raby (12), and Alex Saletta (12) serve as the chairs and chief organizers for the event, with juniors Ben Hicks (11) and Gabby Saletta (11) serving as co-chairs. The twelve committees each have a chair and an additional four to five group members to prepare for the event, which will be held at Tiger Stadium on Friday, May 5th, from 6pm to midnight.

Relay for Life was founded in 1985 when Dr. Gordon Klatt, a surgeon from Tacoma, Washington, decided to use his passion of marathoning to raise money and awareness for cancer. Klatt announced his plan to walk continuously around the track at a local university for 24 straight hours,

\$25 to walk alongside him for 30 minute intervals. After 24 consecutive hours of walking, Klatt had logged 83 miles, and raised over \$27,000 for cancer research. Following his inaugural relay, Klatt began recruiting teams in the Tacoma area to hold their own Relay for Life to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Eventually, Dr. Klatt's message would contagiously expand across the nation and the world, and today, Relay For Life has raised more than \$5 billion worldwide.

SALT's staff leader Brian Baugh said that after discussion with the four senior chairs this past summer, it became apparent that SALT needed to organize a positive event to aid in connecting the Loveland community with the school district. The Relay For Life campaign, already hosted by numerous Cincinnati area high schools, served as a perfect opportunity for SALT to strengthen the Loveland community.

SALT will begin to recruit local teams, clubs, organizations, businesses, and students to form 10-person Relay teams, which will raise \$500 each, and continue Dr. Klatt's legacy by walking around the track at Tiger Stadium for six consecutive hours. Loveland SALT has an official goal of raising \$10,000 for the American Cancer Society, but with the help of students and local businesses, could realistically raise close to \$50,000. The 6-hour event in May will include a survivorship walk, a candlelight vigil, and team spirit events.

## **FTC Robotics Teams Advance** to State Championship

Loveland's First Tech Challenge Robotics Teams, "Nuts and Bolts" and "The Bionic Tigers" have advanced to the Ohio State Championship. They both won the Inspire Award, the highest award in FIRST Tech Challenge, at qualifier competitions.

"The Bionic Tigers" competed at the Kirtland Qualifier near Cleveland on January 7th. Although the team placed 14th in the elimination rounds, they were able to make an exciting comeback after winning the Inspire Award, FIRST Tech Challenge's highest award, which is given to the team that not only has a great robot but is also highly professional and works extensively with the community. Since the team was able to win this award, they were able to advance to the state competition. Luke Blaker (12), team lead for "The Bionic Tigers" says that he "is excited to attend the state championship" and that he's "hopeful that our team will qualify for the world championship."

Later, "Nuts and Bolts" competed at the Miami University Qualifier on January 14th. At that competition, they placed 5th in the initial elimination rounds, but they were selected as the first pick of the 1st seed alliance. After the intense final rounds, "Nuts and Bolts" alliance was able to win, which allowed them to take a state championship qualification spot. Later, during the awards ceremony, it was announced that they had won the Inspire Award as well. Allison Spitzley (11), team lead for "Nuts and Bolts" says that this award "not only advances our team to Ohio State but recognizes Loveland's outreach to very difficult for teams to get there. the community to involve them in STEM."

competition in which teams across the it will be on Saturday, March 11th at the world build robots to complete tasks that are established at the start of the season as a part of the game reveal. This year's game is called "Power Play," in which teams must score cones on top of towers. This program teaches participants skills in engineering, programming, and business, which translate well to college and workplace.

Teams generally build their robots starting at the game reveal in September until they begin competing in January. This year, Loveland's teams decided to compete at Kentucky's League Meets in November, which are low stress opportunities to test robots and practice driving, but they required that robots be completed by November. Since these league meets, Loveland's teams have continued improving their robots, with "The Bionic Tigers" even completely redesigning their robot to be more efficient. In January, teams begin to compete at qualifier competitions for the Ohio State Championship, in which 5 teams advance from each event. If teams can advance, they will attend the Ohio State Championship, where teams compete for one of 2 spots at the World Championship in Houston, Texas. Loveland's teams will also be competing at the Kentucky State Championship, giving them the opportunity to qualify for Worlds there as well. While both of Loveland's teams have attended Worlds in the past, with "The Bionic Tigers" attending last year, only about 2% of FIRST

#### Titanic Celebrates ts 25th Yea

For 25 years, Titanic, starring Leonardo Dicaprio and Kate Winslet, has been a staple of cinematic love stories. The film highlights the story of a wealthy 17-year-old who falls in love with a poor artist aboard the R.M.S Titanic, the historic ship that famously crashed into an iceberg and sank in the Atlantic Ocean in 1912. This year, the film will be re-released in theaters on February 10th to celebrate its 25th anniversary. The film has been remastered in 4K 3D for its re-release, but everything else about the film will remain the same.

Although the true 25th anniversary of the film was in December, the director, James Cameron, chose to re-release it in February. In an interview on SiriusXM's The Jess Cagle Show, Cameron said, "the date that made sense to me was Valentine's Day, because, in the original release, which was 1997 into 1998, we came out a few days before Christmas. I think it was [December 19]. But the highest-grossing single day of the release was Valentine's Day." Cameron further explains that it's, "very unusual for a film that's been in the marketplace for two months to have its biggest single performing day. So [the re-release is] a

celebration of love. It's a celebration of the movie, at the same time. And it's a celebration of the success of the movie as well." Additionally, Cameron directed Avatar: Way of Water, which came out on December 16th, 2022, only three days before the true 25th anniversary of Titanic. This was most likely a strategic



move by Cameron to have a longer period of relevancy for his films.

In 2017, Titanic returned to theaters as a 20thanniversary celebration, like it is doing now, which is making fans wonder why there is a 25th-anniversary celebration and a 20th-anniversary celebration.

Cameron explained that "I figured that I was probably not going to be around for the 50th anniversary, so why not celebrate the 25th anniversary...there's another kind of half-generation of people that haven't seen Titanic in a movie theater and maybe a bunch of nostalgia for, you know, amongst people that have seen it in a movie theater or have always wanted to."

After its release in 1997, Titanic won eleven Academy Awards: Best Picture, Best Director, Best Cinematography, Best Film Editing, Best Art Direction-Set Direction, Best Costume Design, Best Original Dramatic Score, Best Original Song, Best Sound, Best Sound Effects Editing and Best Visual Effects. It is also the third highest-grossing film worldwide of all-time, following Avatar and Avengers: Endgame. According to forbes.com, Titanic has grossed roughly \$1.8 billion worldwide, \$600 million domestically, and \$28 million in the first weekend. Titanic was successful and remains timeless, so Cameron can expect great success this February.

Valentine's day is here! You will see so many places decorated with hearts, glitter, red and white decor. Couples being handed heart-shaped candies, stuffed toys, balloons, and varieties of chocolates.

We know what people here in the USA do for Valentine's Day. How about the rest of the world, though? What do they do on the day of love? Before we get into the different traditions around the world, here is a brief history about Valentine's Day.

History Surrounding Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is celebrated worldwide in honor of Saint Valentine, but who is this enigmatic figure and why is the holiday celebrated with such enthusiasm? According to legend, Valentine was a priest in Rome during the third century. When Claudius II declared that single men made better soldiers than those with children and wives, he banned young soldiers from getting married. Valentine began performing secret marriages for young couples in protest against the injustice being done to young males. When the emperor learned of Valentine's acts, he demanded that the saint be executed. Saint Valentine gained popularity over time to the point where Valentine's Day is now recognized as the day of love by lovers everywhere.

<u>Traditions Around the World</u>

Here are some countries and their traditions for Valentine's day.

**Argentina** 

In Argentina, people celebrate "The Week of Sweetness" in July instead of Valentine's Day in February. On this day, couples exchange kisses and receive chocolates and other sweets. Sweetness week takes place in the first week of July, from the 1st to the 7th. It was founded in Argentina in 1989 as a result of the advertising campaign "a candy for a kiss" created by the brand Arcor. It was part of a salesboosting marketing strategy. Every July 1st, we can see posters promoting this occasion in newspapers and candy stores.

The equivalent to Valentine's Day in Bulgaria is called Trifon Zarezan, also known as The Day of Winemakers. They have a day of wine and feasting to honor St. Trifon, the patron saint of vineyards. On this day, it is customary to prune the vines. Winemakers go into their vineyards, trim the vines, water the soil with wine, and pray for a good harvest. Everyone in the village then contributes fresh bread, fried chicken, and a wine container. They all vote for the king, who produces the best wine and grapes. They dress him in a crown of cut vines and lead him solemnly to his home. There, he generously draws them

with wine.

<u>Denmark</u>

Valentine's day was not celebrated in Denmark until the 1990s, but that didn't stop the Danes from creating their own twist on Valentine's Day. On February 14, Danish people give pressed white flowers known as "snowdrops" to friends and romantic partners in place of Americans' red roses. Another element of Valentine's Day is the exchange of "lovers' cards," which were originally transparent cards with an image of the sender giving a gift to their partners.

## Growth of Valentine's Day as a Commercial Holiday

From chocolates to flowers, from cards to jewelry, Valentine's Day is a time for giving gifts to those you love. But how did Valentine's Day become what it is today? How did it grow into a huge commercial holiday? Let's find out more about how it all got started and how it's evolved to where it is today.

Valentine's Day originated from the legends surrounding the death of St. Valentine. However, who specifically he was, and what specifically he did, is shrouded in mystery. In fact, the Catholic Church recognizes at least 3 separate saints who were named either Valentine or Valentinus. While there are even more legends than this, they all tell the story of St. Valentine dying in a heroic way on February 14th, causing that day to be called the Feast of St. Valentine in his honor.

But how was it associated with love and romance? While some believe that it was due to St. Valentine's reputation as the "patron saint of lovers," others claim that celebrating St. Valentine's feast day in the middle of February was done in order to "Christianize" the pagan celebration of Lupercalia (History). Lupercalia was a fertility festival celebrated by the Roman people dedicated to the Roman god of agriculture, Faunus, and the two founding leaders of Rome, Romulus and Remus. While Lupercalia supposedly did survive the initial rise of Christianity, it was outlawed by Pope Gelasius I at the end of the 5th century. It is also

believed that Gelasius replaced Lupercalia by declaring February 14th be celebrated as St. Valentines Day, but the holiday would not become celebrated as a day of romance until about the 14th century

Valentine's Day did not become popular until around the 17th century, and along with it came the tradition of gifting Valentine's Day flowers. Valentine's cards did not grow into the mainstream until the 18th century, and at this point they were all handmade. Pre-printed cards did not show up until later in the 18th century in Britain, with the oldest surviving example on display in York Castle Museum, dating back to 1797. The early 19th century and the industrialisation of Britain allowed Valentine's cards to be mass-produced more than ever before. By the mid 1820s, an estimated 200,000 Valentines were circulated in London alone (HistoryExtra). According to the RoyalExaminer, it wasn't until 1861 that an English candy maker named Richard Cadbury had the idea to sell chocolates specifically for Valentine's Day and package them in heart-shaped boxes, popularizing this way of selling it.

Now, Valentine's Day has become a major holiday for the buying and selling of chocolates, flowers, cards, and other romantic gifts to mark the occasion. On average, consumers in the US planned to spend \$175.41 in 2022, combining for an expected total of \$23.9 billion spent. This was an increase from the \$21.8 billion in 2021, and is the second highest yearly amount people planned to spend on record (the highest being \$27.4 billion in 2020) (NRF).

However you enjoy spending Valentine's Day, it's always fun to look back and see how the holiday we know today grew over time into what it is now.

## Loveland Baseball Preview 2023

Loveland sports have endured some high expectations this season, and the baseball program is no different. The bar is set high for the team this year, and in a loaded Eastern Cincinnati Conference, the competition will certainly be fierce.

Before the 2022 season, the last two years for the Loveland Baseball program were mediocre at best. The team went a combined 22-30 the two previous seasons, with just a 13-19 record in the ECC.

However, last season, the Tigers finished with a winning record for the first time since 2018, and that momentum and excitement have clearly carried over into this season. Despite losing Pacific commit Jackson Lux ('22) and five other seniors, this team is loaded with young talent and plenty of guys with varsity experience.

This year's team is led by Morehead State University commit Callum McGill (12) and University of Northwestern Ohio commit Tyler Huff (12). In 2022, McGill threw 32.0 innings, with a 1.09 ERA and 42 strikeouts, racking up one of the best seasons by a pitcher in recent history. McGill was also lethal in the batters' box, batting .264 with 25 RBIs and 2 triples. Huff had a

ridiculous campaign in the box as well, as he batted .325 with a team-high 26 RBIs.

Both of these two are very high on the team's potential this year. Described Huff, "This year's team has a bond like no other team I've been a part of. Throughout this offseason, we've been pushing each other to be the best we can, whether in the weight room or on the field." McGill agrees, "Honestly, this team is special because we have grown up together and seen each other grow in the game of baseball together."

The overwhelming experience on this team is a monumental reason why most people are high on the Tigers coming into the season, Max Harper (11) believes this team's experience will help guide the Tigers to a great season "We have ten seniors playing a large role in this team and it is a blessing to have such an experienced roster. These guys have played at the varsity level and know how to win." Drew Holman (11) agrees, and truly believes that experience has inspired everyone to work hard this offseason. "With the seniors' help, everyone has been getting after it and this has built an important bond that will certainly translate to the field."

McGill isn't the only dangerous pitcher that could start for this Tigers team. Aiden Hansen (11), Jared Werling

(12), and Tyler Evans (12) lead the rotation for Loveland. As for the offensive side, Ryan Cathey (12), Cole Carrigan (12), and Charlie Meckey (12) lead a deep and well experienced group of hitters.

With an absolutely loaded ECC withWest Clermont, Milford, Kings, and Turpin all having incredible depth and talent, the Tigers are going to need to compete fiercely, and this team seems like the perfect group to do so. With the balance of experience and younger talent, this Tigers team can be the team to win the conference this season.

Loveland's Academic Team, an Ohio High School Athletic Association winter sport, is fascinating to watch and a ton of fun to be a part of. They compete against other schools on Wednesdays at 4:00 PM, with home matches in the library.

Each match has four rounds, with four players per team allowed in each round. The first two are the category rounds, with Round One having the categories American Literature, Math, World History, Fine Arts, and Life Science, and Round Two having World Literature, Government/Economics, Physical Science, Geography, and American History. Each category gives each team the opportunity to answer a question and ends with a toss-up question, which teams must be the first to buzz in to answer. The next round is the Alphabet Round, in which teams are given 4 minutes to answer 20 questions written on a sheet of paper, with all answers beginning with the same letter. The final round is the Lightning Round, where there are 20 questions that are like the earlier toss-up questions, which

require teams to be the first to buzz in. This presents the dilemma of when to buzz, as if teams choose to buzz with incomplete information, they may get the answer wrong, but if they wait until the end of the question, then the other team may buzz first. At the end of the match, the team that has the highest score wins.

Loveland has a new chief of police as of August 2022. Chief Michael J. Gabrielson formerly started off as a patrolman in 1993 and later served as Assistant Chief of Police for the Kettering (Ohio) Police Department. As Assistant Chief, he was in charge of one of the department's two main divisions, with a particular emphasis on patrol operations, administrative assistance, community relations, and criminal investigations.

Chief Gabrielson has more than 20 years of experience as a law enforcement instructor and more than 25 years of experience as an Ohio-Certified Peace Officer. He graduated from Tiffin University with a Master's in Criminal Justice Administration, and he has continued his study through the Northwestern University Center for **Public Safety** 

Chief Gabrielson has ten years of experience in criminal investigations and is knowledgeable about all forms of crime. He's participated in extensive, complex criminal investigations undercover for more than 7 years. He teaches law enforcement officers about drugs, animal fighting, search warrants, firearms (pistol, shotgun, rifle), use of force, emergency vehicle operations, evidence gathering, and many other topics.

Chief Gaberialson held a number of responsibilities during his 29 years of employment with the City of Kettering, among which he held the positions of Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant, and eventually Captain. During his roughly nine years as a detective, he maintained Special Deputation status with the Federal Bureau of Investigations and the United States Marshals Service. He was also a task force investigator for the Ohio Organized Crime Investigations Commission (OOCIC). Chief Gaberialson took part in investigations in Florida, Texas, California, New York, New Jersey, Wisconsin, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Michigan, and Illinois.

He also participated in undercover investigations for instances involving the Interstate Transportation of Stolen Property and Vehicles, Welfare and Food Stamp Fraud, Narcotics Possession and Trafficking, Firearms Possession

and Trafficking, Explosives Possession and Trafficking, violations of the Animal Welfare Act, and Gambling. When undercover Chief Gaberialson says he's "purchased explosives I mean you you name it I probably purchased it at some point a lot of stolen property but yeah it's really an acting job is really what it comes down to is going out and getting somebody's trust and having them commit a

As a Detective, Gaberialson was in charge of receiving and looking into reports of crimes and non-crimes from the public, his colleagues, his superiors, and his own initiative. Investigations into assault, burglary, domestic violence, fraud, homicide, menacing, theft, rape, and robbery have been among his responsibilities.

After getting a promotion to Lieutenant, he was assigned to the Criminal Investigations Section consisting of eight full-time investigators. As a Watch Commander, he was tasked with overseeing two patrol sergeants, fourteen officers, and their units on the third watch (afternoon) shift in order to aid the division commander in the administration, direction, and coordination of division activities. He was in charge of overseeing all 3rd Watch patrol actions on a daily basis. All reports submitted to their agency were examined by Gaberialson, who also handled any follow-up requests from police, detectives, or other divisions or sections. He coordinated collaboration with local, state, and federal agencies in intelligence and criminal justice-related fields. In order to close as many investigations as possible, he also provided help for police and investigators on open/active cases. Gaberialson spent almost five years as a lieutenant.

5. Do you make all of your products at home? At a local location?





The director clarified on Twitter, saying "Here's what happened: As we prepared the production over the last year, it became impossible to wrestle WICKED's story into a single film without doing some real damage to it." The director tells us the reason regarding a sequel, "As we tried to cut songs or trim characters, those decisions began to feel like fatal compromises to the source material that has entertained us all for so many years. We decided to give ourselves a bigger canvas and make not just one WICKED movie but TWO!!!! With more space, we can tell the story of WICKED as it was meant to be told while bringing even more depth and surprise to the journeys for these beloved characters."

The film is anticipated to be released on December 25th, 2023, and its sequel is expected to be released on December 25th, 2024, exactly one year later.

Likewise, it has been made known that Steven Schwartz, who wrote the music and lyrics for the Broadway production, will collaborate with Winnie Holzman to adapt the screenplay. Schwartz later announced on social media that he will be writing two entirely new songs for it and that the film will not be an exact replica of the Broadway production. It has been reported that Marc Platt, who produced the Broadway musical, will also produce the motion picture.

It looks like the famous pop star Ariana Grande's wish came true as she once tweeted in 2011 that she "Loved

seeing Wicked again... amazing production! Made me realize again how badly I want 2 play Glinda at some point in my life! #DreamRole."

Hopefully, the new film will be similar to the musical Wicked and won't change the plot too much, due to it being a live adaptation.

Despite having just four seasons, Skam (the "a" makes an "ah" sound, and it translates to shame in English) was a Norwegian-turned-global phenomenon of a series that followed teenage characters as they navigated high school. The effect that it has had on society does not go unnoticed, even 7 years after its first episode aired. Ask anyone in Norway about Skam and it's safe to say that they can tell you they've seen it or at least heard of it.

Steeped in culture and consistently relevant, many factors allowed Skam to have the impact that it did. It was somewhat unorthodox. Instead of the regular episode format, clips would be released from an official website throughout the week, in real-time. Meaning, if something happened to a character at 7:00 am on Sunday, September 4th, the clip would be uploaded on the show's website at the respective real-life date and time. At the end of the week, the clips were compiled into full-length episodes and aired on the site. The bedlam that the release of a new

clip would cause was common among Norwegian teens. Clips were released with no warning, sort of like the show itself, which had almost no promo prior to its release.

On top of the real-time releases, the characters had Instagram accounts that would be updated with the show, and text messages between them were uploaded to the official website throughout the show's airing. The actors did no interviews, and most were newbies, which added another layer of immersive realism for fans.

One of my favorite aspects about Skam is the fact that each season has a different central character, and they become supporting characters in the seasons that don't focus on them. Season one follows 16-year-old Eva. Noora, a friend of Eva's, is the central character of season two. Season three is when the show's fame truly skyrocketed, reaching an unprecedented international audience. Isak stars as the central character as he comes to terms with his sexuality. Many fans expressed appreciation for its authentic representation of young queer relationships and mental illness, which serves to normalize these challenges

in a progressive, innovative way. The fourth and final season is when viewers get to know Sana, a headstrong Muslim teen and friend of Eva and Noora. Sana's season, much like her character, brings difficult but important conversations to the table.

There are dozens of aspects that I could harp about—it doesn't shy away from difficult topics, it's supremely rich in symbolism, it conquers clichés, and at times it even calls out the negative aspects of its own fanbase. But when it comes down to it, Skam is lovable because it is relatable. Even after it garnered success with an audience of all ages, the show stayed true to its teen-centered nature. Every character has external and internal conflicts that make them real and unique, and ultimately the show depicts the journey of learning to love yourself, even when you're not who you thought you were.
