Deciding which coffee shop has the best coffee can be difficult. At different locations there are different brews, milks, and flavors. Choosing what drink is the most fitting for you can be a process that takes a lot of time and money, but once you find a drink that you love, the journey will most likely be worth it. Coffee shops around the Cincinnati area consist of Starbucks, Dunkin, Awakenings Coffee Roasters, Biggby, Deeper Roots, Mile 42, Branch Hill Coffee, Coffee Emporium, and countless others

In my opinion, deciding on what kind of drink sounds good is the most important part of finding the right coffee shop for you. Whether you want a latte, cappuccino, iced coffee, americano, or plain black coffee, it is important to keep in mind that the brew of the coffee and the milk or milk substitute are crucial in making a delicious coffee.

Mile 42 Coffee and Coffee Emporium use a tangy brew

while making their drinks. If you prefer a smoother type of brew, I suggest getting a latte. The extra cream or milk substitute will overpower the tangy taste leaving a blend of perfection while sampling these drinks. Starbucks and Biggby use a smoother brew. Normally when I order from Starbucks I ask for a small amount of cream so the cream flavor does not drown out the coffee taste.

Biggby employees shared that almond milk and oat milk are huge hits at their coffee shop. I agree that Biggby’s almond milk is the perfect flavor and consistency. The almond milk they use goes with every drink in the shop and makes the perfect flavor blend. I’ve noticed that Biggby drinks are consistent. When I order a drink I have gotten in the past, I know exactly what it will taste like. There is never a discrepancy between one drink and another, if I order the same thing. A Biggby employee shared that she uses a certain method, the chopping method, to mix the ingredients together evenly. The chopping method

involves moving a spoon in an “up and down motion” along with stirring side to side to make sure that the drink’s ingredients are evenly distributed.

Dunkin’s clientele, including me, agree that Dunkin workers fill the cups with an excessive amount of ice, leaving barely enough room for the other ingredients. For this reason, I prefer hot coffee. Dunkin is always hit or miss. I could get a drink I thoroughly enjoy; the next time I order it, it tastes completely different. Although the drinks can be inconsistent, it is a much lower price than other coffee shops around. Dunkin is a good choice if the customer likes surprises.

Narrowing down the enjoyable coffee shops is important so one does not waste money and time on a coffee that is not enjoyed. Knowing the differences between the different types of coffee is also an important part of the process. In my overall opinion, the best coffee shop I’ve been to is Biggby Coffee in Loveland.

Upon entering the high school in 2017, they began plotting how they would go about catching Hutzel. The most difficult step would be infiltrating *The Roar* and

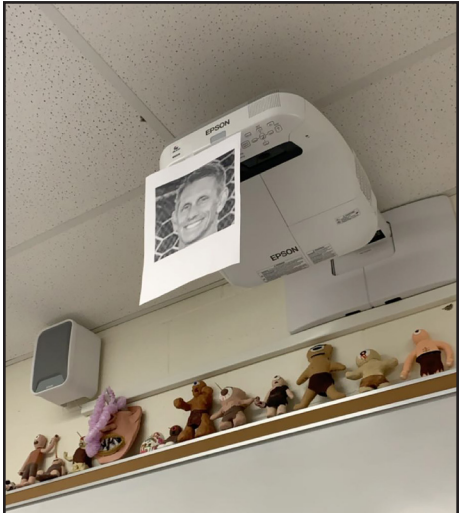

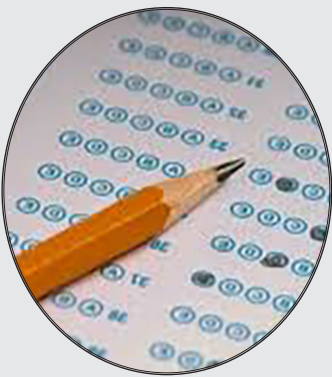

Loveland Spends Millions Rebranding

This past February, the Loveland School Board announced that they would be rebranding the entire school district to feature a hyper realistic frog and a green and mustard yellow color scheme. This decision came after a unanimous vote was made at a board meeting on February 16. This decision was made public on March 1, where it was announced that Loveland would be replacing the decades-old tiger mascot and orange and black color scheme with a new updated logo.

The School Board first began voting on this new design after a group of staff, as well as several students including **Bea Aldrich (12)**, brought the idea and renderings of logos to the board. Aldrich led the petition to rebrand after looking more into the lore behind the iconic *Loveland Frogman*. “I saw all of the frog-themed merch around Loveland and thought that it was absolutely absurd that the school had not branded itself to match the towns’ lore and crazy history,” answered Aldrich when I interviewed

about her involvement with Loveland’s new plan. The Loveland Board’s decision came as a shock to many due to the exuberant amount of money that would have to be spent in order to complete the rebranding process. It is reported that the cost to redecorate just the interior of the high school would be nearly \$2 million; this doesn’t even begin to include the stadium, team jerseys, and other local merchandising. The board decided this was the best decision for the school.

Many teams, including the Loveland Quidditch team known as “The Flying Frogmen,” have been eagerly anticipating this change for many years. “I could not be more excited for this change,” says co president of the Quidditch team, **Molly O’Keefe (12)**. “We have been ready for this change to happen for years,” added **Natalie Harper (12)**.

I turned to the students to gain some insider opinions. Student **Ella Clemons (10)** had this to say on the matter. “I’m honestly so excited for the new changes being made.

I have kind of disliked the orange and black color scheme and think that this new and improved look is an incredible opportunity for the Loveland School District!” Other students such as a student **(11)** who wished to remain anonymous had this to say. “Not to be a Debby Downer, but I just really do not like the changes that are going to be made.” When I further questioned the student, they declined to respond further.

The younger buildings have already begun the process of renaming the buildings and redecorating the interiors.

Board members, in a recent interview, stated that this transition to the “full frog branding,” would take several months and potentially could last long into the 2021-2022 school year due to the drastic changes that are going to occur. The painting process will have to wait until the summer when the number of students in the building will be drastically lower than usual. Until then, the LCSD is anxiously anticipating the arrival of our new “frog-tacular” mascot!

Are Masking Mandates Coming to an end?

Almost a year after Governor DeWine’s statewide stay-at-home mandate, other states are making strides in emerging from regulations and mandates. In early March, Greg Abbott, the Governor of Texas, issued an executive order (GA-34) lifting the mask mandate in Texas and increasing capacity of all businesses and facilities to 100 percent statewide. Abbott had this to say about his decision, “With the medical advancements of vaccines and antibody therapeutic drugs, Texas now has the tools to protect Texans from the virus.” Abbott insisted early on that the mandate lift is not analogous with throwing caution to the wind, but an opportunity for Texans to “determine their own destiny.”

Abbott’s announcement faced numerous variegated reactions, some very ardent in nature. Texas Democratic Party Chair Gilberto Hinojosa stated, “What Abbott is doing is extraordinarily dangerous. He is the worst Governor in modern Texas history. This will kill Texans.” Although social media was, for the most part bashing Abbott, there

were positive responses, as well. Texas Congressman Dan Crenshaw took to Twitter to congratulate Texas on its “Independence Day.” Whatever you want to make of it, Texas is not the first state to ease up on COVID strictures, and as time progresses they will not be the last.

So far, four other states, Mississippi, Iowa, Montana, and North Dakota, have lifted the statewide mask mandates. They’re joining a larger group of 11 states - Alaska, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, and Tennessee - that never required face coverings statewide. Alabama is set to lift its mandate in early April. Governor Kay Ivey announced that beginning April 9, wearing masks will be “a matter of personal responsibility and not a government mandate.” Texas and Mississippi announced they’d be ending mask requirements and allowing businesses to operate at full capacity in the very near future. On March 3, President Biden criticized these announcements and branded them as “neanderthal thinking.”

Currently, the state of Ohio has reported 836,000

confirmed COVID cases, with roughly 800,000 full recoveries made. Ohio has slowly crept its way into normalcy, beginning with (of all things) high school sports. This past fall, high school sports teams began their seasons with trepidation, but completed the season united and resilient. As time has passed, educators and coaches have developed creative ways to maintain stimulating environments while abiding by state regulations. Being a swing state, Ohio’s socio-economic diversity has caused for mixed feelings regarding the ordinances in place. But quite frankly, Ohio has been united compared to the disparity present in certain areas of the country.

As the Loveland community moves forward and the regulations continue to subside, it’s imperative to maintain a strong sense of teamwork and understanding. Of course it is important to follow the set guidelines, but it’s even more important to take care of your loved ones and help lead the community back into normalcy. 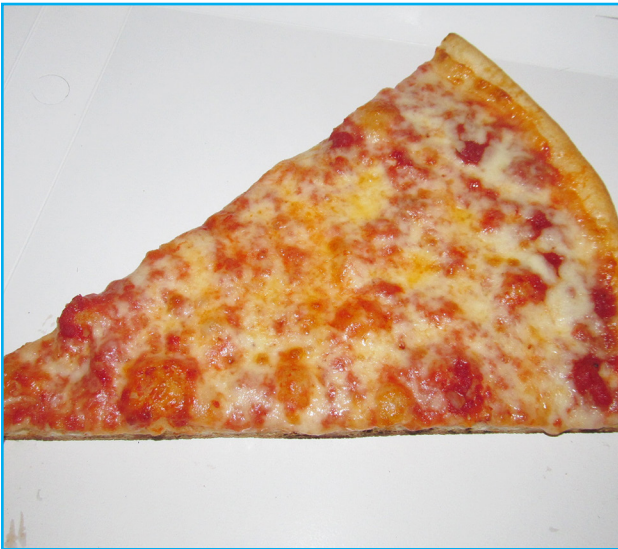

The return of Spring Training since late February has given fans an insight into what their teams could look like for this new season (a luxury that did not exist last season as a result of the COVID 19 pandemic). All of the work teams have put in over the offseason will come to a head in just a few days, when the first pitch will be thrown on April 1, for Opening Day 2021.

All 30 ball clubs find themselves playing on April 1st in what should be an exciting day for baseball fans

everywhere. Of the 15 matchups, a few stand out above the rest.

The defending champion Dodgers will travel to Denver to face off against the Colorado Rockies with their newest acquisition of last year's Cy Young award winner and former Cincinnati Reds pitcher, Trevor Bauer expected to start for LA. The Rockies had a tougher offseason, losing star 3rd baseman Nolan Arenado to the St. Louis Cardinals, meaning there are some big question marks in Denver heading into this season, leading to an attractive Opening Day matchup.

As for our Cincinnati Reds, they will be without Trevor Bauer as mentioned earlier, suggesting that Sonny Gray will likely be the day one starter. The Reds are trying to bounce back after suffering some tough losses in the first round of the playoffs last season against the Atlanta Braves, when the Reds went scoreless in both games.

Their opponent for Opening Day is another team mentioned earlier, the St. Louis Cardinals who, after acquiring Arenado from the Rockies over the offseason,

are putting together what looks to be a formidable Opening Day lineup. The Cardinals were also the first team amongst all 30 MLB clubs to name a starter for Opening Day, Jack Flaherty who is coming off a 2020 season with a 4.91 ERA.

This in division matchup between two rival clubs is certainly going to be one to watch all across the country, but especially for Reds fans eager to snag a second consecutive year in the playoffs. But without Bauer, there will certainly be some challenges. Nonetheless, the Reds will start their season on April 1st like the rest of Major League Baseball with a game at Great American Ball Park at 4:10 PM.

Perhaps the best part of Opening Day 2021 compared to last season will be the addition of fans. The Reds have unveiled a plan to allow 30% capacity in GABP for every home game this season, which means about 12,700 fans will get to enjoy the Opening Day showdown between the Reds and Cardinals in what could be one of the most exciting baseball seasons to date.

Greek Militant Suffers Kidney Failure After Hunger

Revolutionary Organization 17 November (17N) was a Greek far-left guerilla group operating from 1975 to 2002. Led by Alexandros Gitotopoulos, 17N had carried out an extensive guerilla campaign against banks, corporations, the Greek government, and various Turkish, U.S, and British officials, killing a total of twenty-three people over the course of the twenty-seven years. It had been classed as a terrorist organization by the countries mentioned above, and eventually disbanded in 2002 following the arrests and trials of its members.

One of those former members is the 63 year-old Dimitris Koufidinas; convicted of eleven of the twenty-three murders, he was sentenced by the Greek government

to eleven life sentences. Dimitris was incarcerated in 2003 into the Korydallos Prison in Athens along with other members of 17N, but since then has been transferred several times to different facilities. Before being taken to a hospital, he was most recently being held in a high security prison in Domokos.

Dimitris began a hunger strike (a tactic he has successfully used in the past to have demands met) on January 8, demanding from the Greek government that he be transferred back to Korydallos, also stating that the prison transfer to Domokos he underwent in December was a violation of his rights as an inmate. Dimitris has been without food for over two months, and his personal doctor, Thodoros Sdoukos, has serious concerns about his health. Thodoros told the Athens radio station Sto Kokkino that, “We are talking about hours of life remaining. We have reached the ‘zero moment’ that we all hoped to avoid.

I will say it plainly: His life is in imminent danger.” Dimitris is in critical condition and is being treated at a hospital in Lamia for his failing kidneys, receiving regular hydration and medicine; the pathology ward stated, “In full compliance with current legislation, ICU staff are taking all the necessary medical and pharmacological actions to deal with the consequences of the patient’s persistent refusal to eat or receive liquids.” But, despite his dire condition on the brink of death, the government has continued to deny his request for relocation.

On the 54th day of his hunger strike, protests calling for the release/fulfillment of Dimitris' request spiked. Thousands of people rallied in his support in Athens for days on end. Other radical leftists had been protesting since the strike began; clashes with the police occurred constantly, as well as police stations in the capital being

bombarded with homemade bombs. The topic of Dimitris confinement has become entirely pervasive in Greek politics and media, and important questions have been raised regarding the incarceration and rights of terrorists. In contrast to the violence and loud opposition from the protesters, it seems that for most Greeks, their sympathies lie with the government; a recent public opinion poll revealed that almost 70% of people oppose Dimitris's demands.

Whatever the government’s decision regarding Dimitri’s relocation may be, it is literally a matter of life and death, and will, without a doubt, cause outrage either way.

Myanmar Government Violently Cracks Down on Protestors

The struggle against the Myanmar government’s military coup in early February is still ongoing, with the country seeing a worrying increase in political turmoil and violence on behalf of the state. General Hlaing and the rest of the military regime are showing no signs of relinquishing any power or releasing Aung San Suu Kyi, let alone restoring the short-lived democratic freedoms that existed beforehand. As the pro-democracy movement enters its fourth week, the

international community continues to do nothing more than release statements condemning the coup, despite the protestors pleading for aid, sanctions, and a general call to action.

The epicenter of the conflict is raging in the largest city of Myanmar, Yangon. Here, military commanders have been working closely with police forces in order to crush dissent. The methods of control have become increasingly violent: tear gas, rubber bullets, and beating protestors with batons and shields have all been used. Police have also begun deploying stun grenades. In one instance, in Yangon,

stun grenades were targeted at a group of protestors, with the police proceeding to make an arrest; journalists moving in to document it were repelled by advancing officers. This is only one of the many acts of hostility towards journalists and the press: according to reports from Al Jazeera, two other members of the press have been arrested, so far.

Scarily reminiscent of acts of terror by the previous military regime in Myanmar, March 3rd has been the bloodiest day since the protests began in early February; the police shot and killed a total of 33 people on that day alone in various cities across the country. Most of these deaths were the result of the police firing freely into crowds of peaceful protestors, after a barrage of tear gas and rubber bullets. One of the protestors shot in Mandalay was rushed to the hospital, where a doctor attempted to stop the significant bleeding; but, the police prevented her from providing adequate treatment for the man. “I believe I could have saved him,” she said to Al Jazeera. “I was sure I could have stopped his wound from bleeding. I asked the police to watch his wound and if needed, apply pressure.” He died soon after; officials went on to blatantly lie, stating that the man died of Covid-19.

The regime is showing no signs of stopping their brutal crackdown on the dissenters, and people are starting to fear the worst. John Quinley, a researcher for Fortify Rights, said that, “Authorities are

using excessive force against peaceful protestors. It’s an oppressive crackdown. The junta is trying to silence everyone calling for democracy and human rights in Myanmar. The junta is not legitimate and should release its hold on power.” Hundreds of people have been detained in Yangon alone; videos posted on social media by the press and protestors alike show long lines of people being filed into the back of army trucks with their hands on their heads.

The people of Myanmar don’t expect much help from any of the Southeast Asian countries; but the need for aid from the UN and other international organizations is dire, and probably the only way the regime can be stopped.

The ACT Test Is No More

Every year, thousands of high school students from across the country find themselves sitting at desks at schools on weekends, their brains laser-focused on a packet that could make or break their college acceptance. This is the reality of the ACT, the dreaded standardized test that has plagued students, teachers, parents, and schools since it was created in Iowa in 1959. Janet Godwin, CEO of the ACT nonprofit organization announced earlier this month that her organization will be taking a new direction. This decision comes in lieu of many universities

around the country dropping the requirement of an ACT or SAT score to be admitted into their schools. Upon being interviewed about this decision, Godwin said, "It's time to forget the old way of doing things. Students can no longer be compared simply by the scores they receive on standardized tests." Godwin encouraged students not to take any more standardized tests as she expects The College Board to make a similar decision regarding the SAT.

While students everywhere are rejoicing, there is still some bad news. As for the juniors who recently were forced to take the ACT, their scores will not count and can not be submitted to colleges, and there will be no refunds given to students who paid to have their scores sent away to colleges. As for those who paid ahead of time for the upcoming exam in April, these students will receive a refund as will anyone who has paid for any exams in the future.

Despite not having to take the ACT test anymore, this is not the last that students will hear of the ACT. Godwin promises, however, that her organization will be viewed

in a much better light now as a result of the new steps the company has taken. The ACT will now provide students with resources to become better equipped for college including personalized plans to help students showcase their talents and personalities to various universities.

Despite this change coming out of nowhere, there has been support pouring out from students everywhere as they will no longer have to be drowned by the pressure of their ACT scores. However, there are those who are disappointed with the decision. Many students rely on the ACT to earn scholarships and financial aid to get to college, but the ACT thought this issue through, as well. Godwin stressed the importance of creating financial aid programs that will provide life changing money to underprivileged students who wish to attend college, without having to get a remarkable score on the ACT.

This shocking decision will continue to make waves through the world of education and the college admissions process. For the moment, however, students everywhere can rest easy knowing they won't have to exhaust themselves taking standardized tests to get into college.

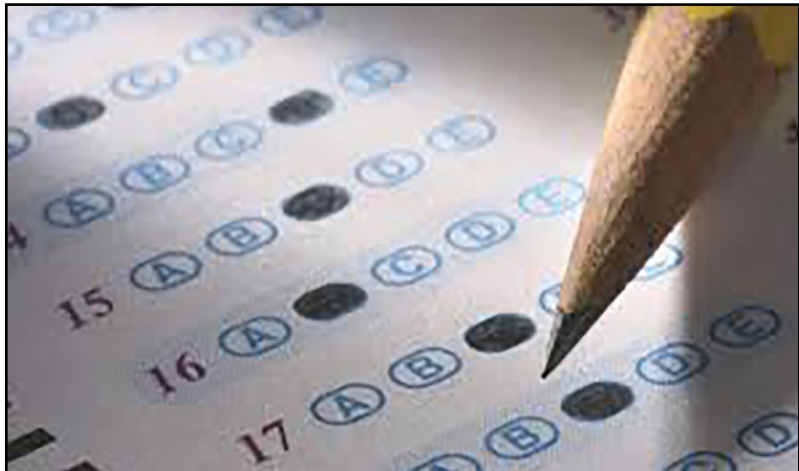

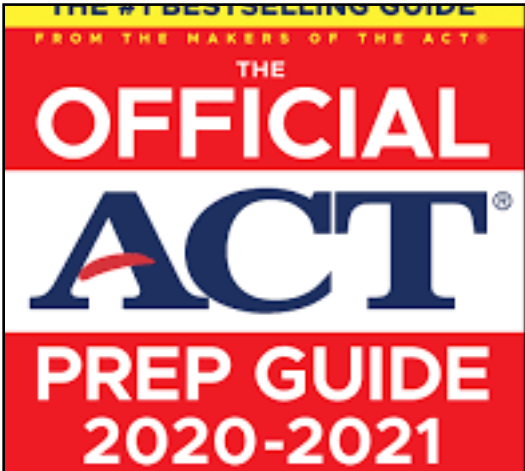

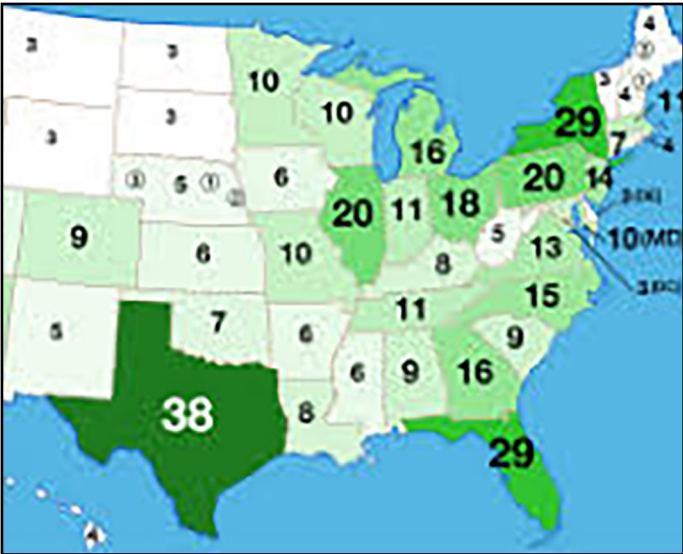

Avatar: Its History and Its Future

If you’ve seen or even just heard of Avatar: The Last Airbender before, it isn’t really much of a surprise. It’s often regarded as one of the best cartoons of all time. Avatar: The Last Airbender was an American animated television series produced by Nickelodeon Animation Studios. It aired on Nickelodeon for three seasons, from February 2005 to July 2008. Originally using the full title of the original show, it was later switched to just The Last Airbender, due to concerns that people would confuse it with the 2009 film Avatar. While originally planned to be

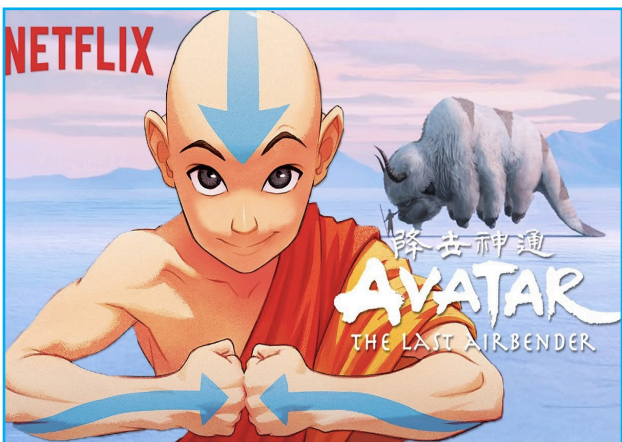

In fact, the movie has a 5% rating by critics and a 30% audience score on Rotten Tomatoes, and some have even described it as one of the

worst movies ever made. On April 14th, 2012, a sequel series, The Legend of Korra, premiered on Nickelodeon. This series takes place seventy years after the original show, and focuses on Korra, who became the next Avatar after the death of Avatar Aang. The series continued on until it finally ended on December 19, 2014. Like it’s predecessor, The Legend of Korra did receive critical acclaim, however many fans felt it did not fully live up to the legacy that the original show created.

Other media have also spawned from this cartoon universe, including numerous books and comics. More recently, Avatar: The Last Airbender was brought onto the well-known streaming service: Netflix, in May of 2020. When it arrived, the show broke the record for longest consecutive appearance on Netflix’s daily top ten list, with 60 straight days on the list. This was later followed by The Legend of Korra joining Netflix as well in August. What comes next? Well, on February 24th, 2021, Nickelodeon announced the creation of the new “Avatar Studios.” This studio will supposedly be a division of Nickelodeon working together with the original creators of the shows to create new series and films set in the cartoons’ universe. The first project for the studio will supposedly be the creation of an original theatrical animated film beginning production this year.
